West 37th Ave and South Bernard Street intersection has heavy traffic from commuters and parents taking children to and from school. There is currently no cross walk at West 37th and S Bernard as there is no sidewalk on the corner property of 307 West 37th Avenue. There is a sidewalk immediately adjacent to the property at 3718 S Bernard that extends toward West 40th Avenue. The property of 307 West 37th Avenue has a gravel walkway that pedestrians are using because there is no sidewalk. Parents have voiced concerns about crossing Bernard using West 37th because there are young children crossing the busy intersection to Jefferson Elementary School when there is dense traffic and no crosswalk. There is bus stop 37TBERMEM on the corner of Bernard and West 37th Avenue but to cross the street to the opposite side of Bernard there is no crosswalk. There is also a major bike route on the master bike plan which is supposed to be a bike lane on both S Bernard and also on West 37th Avenue. This intersection is part of the pedestrian plan and there are ADA ramps on eastern side of West 37th Avenue and Bernard on both sides. There is a plan to infill the eastern side of South Bernard as funds become available. Several residents have installed sidewalk from 37th Street south on Bernard toward High Drive This project would extend the sidewalk area already established by citizens.

Desired outcome would to have sidewalk installed on the 307 W 37" Property facing Bernard. A crosswalk would be installed at 37th and Bernard. An ADA ramp would also be installed on the corner of the 307 W 37th Ave property.

ORIGINAL TRAFFIC CALMING REQUEST

The proposed project is to conduct a traffic and access study in order to analyze the reconfiguration of Grand Blvd between 29th Ave. and 32nd Ave. The results of the traffic and access study may lead to a restriping pilot project similar to the re-striping on East Sprague.

FINAL PROJECT DECISION

Estimated Cost: 86,180

The City Council has chosen not to fund this project in the cycle year but would like to work with the neighborhood council to figure out a scope for a study so that an actual cost can be put on a study around the Manito Shopping Center and Sacajawea that would spell out improvements for pedestrian safety. This project is a priority for excess traffic calming funds or next year's funding cycle for traffic calming.

TRAFFIC CALMING DEVICE OR TREATMENT REQUESTED:

The traffic and access study would consider reducing the number of traffic lanes from a 5-lane street section to a 3-lane street section beginning at 30th Ave. and continuing south. The study would also consider:

1) Marked crosswalks with pedestrian refuge island at 30th, 31st, 32nd Ave.

2) On street parking on Grand Blvd between curb cuts

 The potential relocation of curb cuts to accommodate crosswalks/pedestrian refuge medians and on-street parking.

 Consultation and coordination with businesses, property owners and Spokane Public Schools in order to maintain and improve access to their properties within the Grand District Center.

There is an ADA ramp adjacent to Sacajawea Middle School on East 33rd Ave but across the street below Hart Field boundary and the property of 3303 South Manito Blvd facing East 33rd Ave there is broken sidewalk and curbing. The corners of S Manito Blvd intersecting with East 33rd Ave also lack ADA ramps at the property of 3227 S Manito BLVD and East 37th Avenue and the Property boundary of 3303 S Manito Blvd and East 37th Avenue. 

SPOKANE CITY COUNCIL PASSED THE CELL TOWER ORDNANCE---- 6 NOVEMBER


The Spokane City Council created a "hierarchy of preferred locations" for the towers.


It placed new rules on companies that propose building cell towers in, or within 150 feet of, residential zones.

1/ Companies must first attempt to put towers on existing cell facilities or "structures of a similar height to avoid construction of new towers."

2/ Companies must also first look to city property or facilities, as well as industrial, office and commercial zones, before the city will allow them to build a tower on a residential parcel.


RECOMMENDATIONS

The analysis of this location has shown that traffic volumes are typical for an arterial street. The average speeds for Lincoln are below the posted speed limit. 29th Avenue average speeds are slightly above the posted speed limit, but are not unusual for a Principal Arterial.

This intersection has a consistent collision pattern and involves traffic traveling from north Lincoln to south Lincoln. The most effective manner to address this collision pattern would be to install a traffic island. The traffic island would not allow the north to south traffic movement, yet still allow for left turns from 29th to go north on Lincoln and left turns from Lincoln to go east on 29th (see drawing below).

The traffic island would also allow for space to install additional signs in the middle of the intersection to further warn southbound traffic on Lincoln Street that they must stop. Approximate cost is \$30,000.

The neighborhood request for a Speed Feedback Sign would not address the collision pattern. Additionally, the location of a Speed Feedback Sign to be most effective for southbound traffic on Lincoln would be a challenge.
